COUNCIL News

The Village Council meets on the second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Village Hall. Agendas and minutes are posted on the website.

Amended the Village Code for Chapter 14 "Businesses" Article 3 "Alcoholic Beverages" by creating a new Section 14-62 "Posting of Underage Drinking Notices".

If you need more information about this code amendment, please contact the Police Department at (561) 968-8243.

Amended the Land Use from High Density Residential to Light Industrial for the 14.23 acre parcel of land located at 1200 South Congress Avenue.

Approved an Agreement with CJNB, Inc., for voluntary annexation for the two parcels located at 2838 South Military Trail and an adjacent vacant lot.

Annexed two parcels of land, totaling .96 acres, owned by CJNB, Inc. and located at 2838 South Military Trail and an adjacent vacant lot; also amended the land use to Commercial and the zoning to Commercial General.

Authorized a loan in the principal amount of \$14,352,351.00 in order to refinance the Village's 2003 loans with the Florida Municipal Loan Council and to provide additional funding for Capital Expenditures for the Village's Water and Sewer Utility System, with a reduction in the interest amount from 4.5% to 2.3%.

Amended the Schedule of Fees for the Village's Clerk/General Government, Public Safety, Code Enforcement and Leisure Services Departments within the Village to adjust for actual costs for providing services.

Approved an Agreement with East Coast Pyrotechnics in the amount of \$10,000 for the Village's July 4th Fireworks Display.

Approved an agreement with Eckler Engineering for the design and construction phases for the Main Water Treatment Plant Filter Control Structure Replacement, with design services at a lump sum of \$7,000 and services during construction not to exceed \$7,000.

Approved an agreement with Eckler Engineering for the design and construction phases for the R.L. Pratt Water Treatment Plant Filter Rehabilitation, with design services at a lump sum of \$57,000 and the services during construction not to exceed \$47,500.

Approved an agreement with Eckler Engineering for the design and construction phases for Rehabilitation of Monica, Davis Road and the Professional Plaza Pump Stations, with design services for a lump sum of \$61,000 and services during construction not to exceed \$41,600.

Approved an agreement with Eckler Engineering for services during construction, for a fee not to exceed \$94,900, for the final two phases for the sanitary sewer system improvements, with Phase One being Lakewood Road west of Kirk Road, Patio Court south of Lakewood Road, 43rd Drive, 42nd Avenue South, Kenyon Road,

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation announcing April 27, 2013 as Arbor Day in Palm Springs and inviting everyone to attend the planting of a bottlebrush tree at Frost Lake. Palm Springs has been designated as a Tree City USA for 20 years in a row.

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation announcing the week of May 5 – 11, 2013 as Municipal Clerk's Week, thanking the Clerk's Office for their diligent, impartial service to the residents of Palm Springs.

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation announcing the week of April 14 – 20, 2013 as Public Safety Telecommunicators Week and thanked the Palm Springs Dispatch team for their continued dedication to their jobs.

Re-appointed Helene Baggett to the Library Board for a three year term to expire on April 24, 2016.

Re-appointed Douglas DeVos and Sandra Lynn Player to the Construction Board of Adjustment and Appeals for three year terms to expire on April 27, 2016.

Pina Colada French Toast

Ingredients

- 6 slices whole grain bread
- 1 egg
- ¼ cup coconut milk
- 1 teaspoon rum extract
- 3 tablespoons pineapple juice
- 2 tablespoons toasted coconut (garnish)
- 2 tablespoons crushed or chopped pineapple
- For syrup:
- ¼ cup agave nectar
- 2 tablespoons dark rum
- 1 teaspoon coconut extract



Instructions

1. In a bowl, mix the coconut milk, pineapple juice, rum extract and egg.
2. Dip each slice of bread in mixture.
3. Cook on a hot skillet over med-high heat until golden and crisp on the outside.
4. Arrange on a plate and top with coconut and pineapple.



PROTECT YOUR BABY

As a new or expectant parent or a relative living in a home with a baby, it is important to create a safe sleep environment for the baby. There is information available about how to keep your baby as safe as possible so everyone can rest easier.



Did you know?

- Suffocation and strangulation in an adult bed is the leading cause of injury-related death for Florida infants under age 1.
- The risk of sleeping-related infant death is 40 times higher for babies who sleep in adult beds compared to babies who sleep in their own cribs.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, babies are safest when sleeping alone, on their backs, in a crib in the parents’ room for the first six months of life. However, if the parent or their partner smokes in the bedroom, the crib should be placed in a room that is smoke free.

The American Academy of Pediatrics also recommends the following:

- The crib should be undamaged and meet current Consumer Product Safety guidelines www.cpsc.gov
- The crib mattress should fit tightly in its frame and have a snug fitted sheet.
- If a blanket is needed, babies should be placed with their feet near the foot of the crib and covered from the chest down with a thin blanket that is then tucked around the sides and bottom of the mattress to avoid covering the baby’s head.
- No other objects should be placed in the crib.

Also, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is the leading cause of death among infants 1 month to 1 year old, and claims the lives of about 2,500 each year in the United States. It remains unpredictable despite years of research. Even so, the risk of SIDS can be greatly reduced. First and foremost, infants younger than 1 year old should be placed on their backs to sleep — never face-down on their stomachs.

Some other recommendations to help reduce the risk of SIDS are:

- Place your baby on a firm mattress to sleep.
- **Do not** use bumper pads in cribs.
- Make sure your baby receives all recommended immunizations.
- Make sure your baby does not get too warm while sleeping.
- Do not smoke, drink, or use drugs while pregnant and do not expose your baby to secondhand smoke.
- Receive early and regular prenatal care and sure your baby has regular well-baby checkups.
- Breastfeed, if possible.
- Offering a pacifier has also been linked to a decreased risk of SIDS — for breastfed infants, delay pacifier introduction until 1 month of age to ensure breastfeeding is firmly established.
