COUNCIL News

The Village Council meets on the second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Village Hall. Agendas and minutes are posted on the website.

Village Council voted to change the meeting time for all future Council Meetings to 6:30 PM from 7:30 PM. Any required Local Planning Agency Meeting would also begin at 6:30 PM, with the Council Meeting commencing immediately afterwards.

Established the Village's operating millage rate (tax levy) of \$3.9000 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation and establishing a voted debt service millage rate (tax levy) of \$0.7117 per assessed valuation, for a total millage rate of \$4.6117 for fiscal year October 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014.

Established the Village's total budget of \$30,386,273, which is comprised of the General Fund budget of \$14,055,931; the Debt Service Fund budget of \$429,125, and a budget of \$15,901,217 for the Water and Sewer Enterprise Fund for fiscal year October 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014.

Amended the Village Code of Ordinances Chapter 34 "Land Development" Article VI "Land Use" Division 6 "District Regulations" Subdivision II "RS Residential Single Family" Section 34-746 "Property Development Regulations" to reduce the minimum lot dimension regulations from 75 feet to 65 feet.

Amended the Village Code of Ordinances Chapter 2 "Administration" Article IV "Departments" Division 2 "Department of Public Safety" Section 2-204 "Public Safety Reserve" to allow the Police Department to hire reserve officers that live outside the Village and remove sections that will now be covered by the Police Department General Orders.

Adopted a revised and restated General Employees Pension Fund Ordinance that allows for changes in the Investment Policy for the Fund.

Classified the Business Tax Receipts Section to ensure that businesses that have outdoor and/or indoor sales floor space and inventory would be considered in the *Office: retail and wholesale store* tax category.

Annexed property owned by Judith DeWitt into the Village, located at 4111 Lake Worth Road, approved a "commercial" land use designation and a "commercial general" zoning designation.

Approved a Police Department Budget Amendment to recognize \$8,544 in Grant Funds from the Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance, to support Staff training and \$\$5,676 from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement to install a card access system for police department building security.

Approved an amendment to the Cingular Wireless Cell Tower Agreement that would extend the term and increase revenue to the Village. This tower is located on the Village Complex ballfields.

Renewed the Agreement with Susan Ruby, Esquire, to serve as the Village's Code Enforcement Special Magistrate for an additional two year term to expire on July 14, 2015

Approved an Annual Plan of Service and a Long Range Plan of Service for the Library.

Renewed the Village's Property, Liability, Casualty and Workers Compensation Insurance with the Florida League of Cities Florida Municipal Insurance Trust for the fiscal year 2013/2014.

Appointed Sally Panozzo to the Leisure Services Board for a term to expire on March 27, 2015.

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation announcing September as Sickle Cell Awareness Month in Palm Springs.

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation proclaiming September 21, 2013 as MIA/POW Recognition Day in Palm Springs.

Issued a Mayor's Proclamation supporting the Literacy Coalition of Palm Beach County's "Campaign for Grade Level Reading".

Ask a Master Gardener

Growing Tomatoes in South Florida

The tomato, a relative of the pepper, potato, and eggplant is the most popular garden vegetable. Tomatoes may be started in the garden or container by planting seeds or by setting transplant seedlings. Now is the best time of the year to plant tomatoes. There are two different varieties, indeterminate and determinate. Determinate tomatoes are a bush variety. They ripen earlier and mostly all at once. Indeterminate tomatoes are vines that ripen and produce over a long period of time. To also increase the length of your production, you can stagger your plantings from September to early spring.

Container gardening is a great choice for people who live in condos and apartments with limited gardening space. Many people prefer planting tomatoes in containers even if they have garden space. Container gardening with a sterile soil also helps with keeping nematodes, which are insects that attack the roots of tomatoes, out of your soil. Choose at least a 5 gallon size container with plenty of drainage holes, although 10 gallons or larger would give you a better yield. Tomatoes have large root systems, which must be accommodated by the large pot. A bottom for the container will keep the nematodes from coming up out of the ground. Fertilize every two weeks with a water soluble plant food. It will take approximately 90 days from seed start to harvest.

Whether you start your own seeds or buy seedlings from a garden shop, transplant into the ground when they reach at least six inches high and soon after a rain, when cloudy, or in late afternoon. Keep roots moist and undamaged. Dig planting holes as deep as the root ball plus the bottom 2/3 of the plant's stem. Strip lower leaves from the bottom 2/3 of the tomato stems, and place the tomato plant into the hole. If you are planting in a garden, place plants 2 to 3 feet apart so that there is adequate air flow between them. Tomatoes are self-pollinating, rather than by insect, but they need movement or wind to circulate the pollen. If you get flowers but no fruit, try tapping the flowers to pollinate them. If you are planting on a screen porch that is protected from the wind, be sure to do this. Water your tomatoes three to five times a week. Tomatoes need six to eight hours of sunlight a day.

For best quality, harvest tomatoes when they are fully red-ripe. Birds love red ripe tomatoes so if need be, they can be harvested when pink and allowed to ripen in the home. Tomatoes are high in vitamins and minerals, particularly in vitamins A and C. Plus, you cannot beat the taste of homegrown tomatoes.



PREVENTING HOME BURGLARIES

Most residential burglaries occur on a weekday and during business hours to houses that look unoccupied.

Here are some tips to make a would-be burglar pass on your house:

- Make your home look occupied.
- Lock all outside doors and windows before you leave the house or go to bed.
- Even if it is for a short time Lock your doors.
- Leave lights on when you go out. If you are going to be away for any length of time, connect some lamps to automatic timers to turn them on in the evening and off during the day.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked.
- Don't allow daily deliveries of mail, newspapers or flyers build up while you are away. Arrange with the Post Office to hold your mail, or arrange for a friend or neighbor to take them in regularly.
- Contact the Palm Springs Police Department and request to be put on the "House Watch" list if you go away for an extended period of time.
- Arrange for your lawn to be mowed if you are going away for an extended period.
- Pushbutton locks on doorknobs are easy for burglars to open. Install deadbolt locks on all your outside doors.
- Sliding glass doors are vulnerable. Special locks are available for better security.

Don't Tempt a Thief:

- · Lawn mowers, barbecues and bicycles are best stored out of sight
- Always lock your sheds and gates.
- Never leave notes on your door such as "Gone shopping."

Remember to: Light up your residence, lock your doors at all times, and call the Police when you see something suspicious.

The most important thing you can do is call the police to report a crime or any suspicious activity. You have to be the eyes of your neighborhood. And remember, you can always remain anonymous.
